## First Trimester: p. 6, Left Column

- ☐ Social Studies: Richard Scarry's What Do People Do All Day?
  - ♦ Introduction (pp. 6–7)
  - ♦ Everyone is a worker (pp. 8–10)
  - ♦ Have your children help with chores. Take out the trash, feed the dog, or pick up toys, etc. Talk about how everyone is a worker.
  - ♦ Building a new house (pp. 11–16)
  - ♦ Build a house under the kitchen table. Leave room for a door.
  - ♦ Mailing a Letter (pp. 17–20)
  - ♦ Mail a letter to someone, go to the post office, or talk to the mailman.

## Second Trimester: p. 10, Left Column

- ☐ Social Studies: Richard Scarry's What Do People Do All Day?
  - ☐ "Firemen to the rescue" (pp. 37–42)
  - ♦ Dress up like a fireman and pretend to put out a fire.
  - "A visit to the hospital" (pp. 43–46)
  - ♦ Put a bandage on a stuffed animal and make it comfortable, etc.

- ☐ "The train trip" (pp. 47–53)
- ♦ Put kitchen chairs in a row, place stuffed animals on the chairs, and let your children "drive" the train.
- The story of seeds and how they grow" (pp. 54–57)
- ♦ Have your children pretend to be a seed that grows and comes to life, perhaps to classical music.

## Third Trimester: p. 14, Right Column

- ☐ Social Studies: Richard Scarry's What Do People Do
  - "Wood and how we use it" (pp. 64–69)
  - ♦ Find some trees. Touch them, smell them, do a bark rubbing. Try to put your arms around them.
  - ☐ "Building a new road" (pp. 74–81)
  - ♦ Build a road with blocks. Use matchbox cars.
  - ☐ "A voyage on a ship" (pp. 26–31)
  - ♦ Twirl around in a circle to simulate a trip on a ship.
  - "Where bread comes from" (pp. 86–89)
  - ♦ If possible, crack open wheat berries with a hammer and taste. These can also be soaked in water and eaten.
